A Christmas Message from Alison

Dear Friends,

We are approaching a particularly busy time of year Advent and Christmas, there are all the practical preparations, cards, presents etc, to be made and our own preparations to welcome again the Christ child and this year we have a General Election as well. Not since 1923 has a General Election been held in December and there are many thoughts about what effect the time of year will have on voting figures and the outcome. However busy we are we all need to make time to discern the facts behind the spin of the political parties and seek what is best for our country.

Politics and politicians can throw a spanner in the works quite easily and nothing changes in history. At least we do not need to return to our home town to cast our vote!

So how are you going to prepare in Advent aside from food preparation, cards and the other bits and pieces. I find an Advent candle helpful, as the candle burns I focus on God and think about God becoming a human being, one of us. Our preparation need not be onerous just a reminder of the reason for the season.

I haven't seen it myself but I understand that the Christmas advert for one of the supermarkets is using the strap line "A Christmas you can believe in", an intriguing line. I have discovered that it is actually the title of a song by Matthew West which was released in 2014. The last stanza of the lyrics is:

It's grandpa's Bible opened up to Luke Chapter 2
It's the greatest gift of love being born for me and you
It's a heart returning home to the One who is the reason
Every Christmas is a Christmas to believe in
May your Christmas be a Christmas to believe in

I wonder if the designer of the advert knew about the song or just liked the phrase. I hope, even if those who see the advert don't know the song or google the words like I did, it will make everyone think about the season and who and why we celebrate.

Christmas is a wonderful time, the celebration of the coming of Immanuel, God with us. Yet for many it can be a hard time of year, the expectation of gaiety, the pressure to conform to societal pressures for the need of lots of presents, the assumption that everyone will be with family or friends makes the season one of dread and fear. Jesus comes for everyone, those who look to his coming with awe and wonder as well as those who look with fear and dread.

However we approach Advent & Christmas, excitedly or fearfully, the message of Christmas to believe in is one of hope and love as the song puts it

"It's the greatest gift of love being born for me and you."

I wish you all a good Advent, a peaceful Christmas and an Happy New Year.

But there is something endearing about the smile of someone missing their two front teeth! It makes you aware of the other teeth which are every bit as important as the front ones. And we would remind you that the Synod is also made up of the Office and Field Staff, the Ministers, Local Church Leaders, Elders and all the members and adherents of our local churches – all playing our part in the mission of the Church. Let us smile broadly and celebrate each other.

As Christians what we long for isn't shiny new incisors but more of God's kingdom. At Christmas we celebrate the coming of Christ to fill the gaps in our lives and in our world. He comes to bring light in our darkness, hope in our despair and peace in our troubled world. We are invited to come and gaze on the baby born in a humble stable. He was the one that had been longed for and wished for to rescue and to save.

But it wasn't a one-off event. Christ comes afresh to the present troubled world to bring light, hope and peace. At the time of writing this letter we are preparing for a General Election and politicians are promising how to cure the ills of the present world. Promises can sound very easy, the hard thing is making it a reality. We rejoice that God didn't just promise us that he would love us but he showed it in a very tangible way by sending Jesus into the world. As unbelievable as it may sound this was part of God 's plan to change hearts,

minds and the whole world. As John Bell & Graham Maule from Wild Goose put it:

We can be the answer to our own prayers 'All I want is...' As we rejoice in God sending his Son into the world may we discover how he sends us to continue the work that he began.

We would like to wish all of you in local churches a happy and peaceful Christmas. And may you faithfully proclaim that Christ has been born amongst us bringing light in our darkness, hope where there is despair and peace where there is unrest.

14th September "Noah's Ark"

Well our theme was Noah and the great flood but outside it was a beautiful sunny day with no sign of rain and I think most of our messy members had gone out for the day to enjoy the sunshine before the autumn sets in. Even so we had 18 children with their parents, grandparents or guardians and what a wonderful time we all had.

We had a giant Ark for everyone to help decorate and beautiful it looks too.

We had personal Arks that the children could make out of lolly sticks and decorate with animal faces.

We had Noah and his wife walking along the deck and inspecting the Ark before the rain.

Our "foody" table is always successful and this time we had toasted slices of bread for the children to decorate with chocolate spread etc. and cut up fruit to make animal faces.

We had another table where the children could make a mobile ready to hang up at home, representing the Ark with a rainbow in the sky above and the stormy sea below. The dove is an important part of the story of Noah, so we had a table where the children could cut out a template of a dove and attach folded tissue paper to look like wings.

We also had a table where the children could colour in pictures of animals – peaceful and relaxing.

In addition to these wonderful crafts, we had our usual playdoh table and toddler mats with toys.

At 5:15 everyone went out to the Green Room to hear the story of Noah, to sing a song and to pray for our world, families, friends and neighbours. Meanwhile the hall was cleared up and the usual magnificent feast was laid out for one and all to enjoy together.

We thought that we were going to be very, very short of helpers this month but our church rose to the challenge and we had almost as many helpers as children. This was great as we had plenty of time to talk to the children and their parents.

12th October "Harvest"

It was a cold wet day outside and many of our Messy parents must have decided to stay indoors in the warm but we still had 25 children with their parents and guardians. Having so, relatively few, children meant that we could have lovely chats with them and they were telling us all about school and what they would be doing at Halloween. I must say that we always go on about our wonderful band of Angel helpers but our Messy Children and parents are delightful and it is a great pleasure to provide a Messy day for them.

Our Giant craft table this month was a drawing of some fruit and the children had to stick on pictures of fruit and vegetable – the beautiful result is at the front of the church.

We had some lavender bags and dried lavender, especially imported from France, for the children to rub off the dried flower heads to put in the bags to take home to put in a wardrobe and make their clothes smell nice.

We have much to be thankful for and the children made "Thank you" wheels consisting of 2 plates fixed in the middle with a split pin so the top plate could turn and a piece cut out so that different thank you messages could be displayed as the wheel was turned – ingenious and all beautifully decorated.

It's marvellous what you can do with some red and green coloured paper when it is cut and folded into the shape of 3D apples or pumpkins and then hung on a tree.

Corn on the cob is a favourite to eat this time of year so the children made some, using a lettuce leaf with a biscuit covered with icing sugar inside and freshly popped pop corn stuck on top before some flat green lacy sweet was added to represent leaves. I must say that the only examples of these left behind were the lonely looking lettuce leaves.

The hedgehog is our favourite wild animal and so we had some picture frames made up using large lolly sticks and hedgehog templates printed on card for the

children to stick on and then decorate with pumpkin seeds for spines – they looked beautiful.

A drive in the countryside will reveal scarecrows in the farmer's fields so we thought it appropriate to make some using a frame made of lolly sticks (where would we be without them) and various pieces of cut out paper for the children to decorate and personalise.

Everyone went out to the green room to hear the story of Jacob & Esau, to sing a song and say prayers for friends, family, neighbours and our troubled world before coming back into the hall for the hastily prepared feast that awaited them.

We than played the parachute game to loud squeals of laughter and delight before the children departed for home carrying all the things that they had made.

9th November "Remembrance"

!It was a cold and wet day outside but lovely and warm inside as 29 of our Messy children with their parents and guardians gathered to take part in our crafts, loosely associated with Remembrance Day and Guy Fawkes Day.

We had a giant collage where everyone could put a message or the names of people that they would like to be remembered.

The children could make a poppy to their own design and wear with pride.

They could decorate biscuits to look like bonfires. Very tasty

They could make a medal to wear like many brave soldiers.

Using colourful paints they could design their own firework display

How good is your memory? The children and parents had to uncover a tray with 12 items on it and study for 2 minutes and then write down as many as they could remember.

We had silhouettes of soldiers for the children to colour in with camouflage paint.

At 5:15 everyone went out to the Green Room to hear the story: "Where is Jesus?" They said a prayer for our troubled world in the hope of bringing about worldwide peace. They then sang a song before coming back into the hall where a hot meal of jacket potatoes, baked beans and cheese awaited them.

To round the afternoon off we then played the parachute game.

Thank you, once more to our wonderful band of Angels who give up so much of their time to make our messy meetings so successful.

Our next meeting is on the 14th December and the theme will be Christmas

Bexley Winter Shelter (2nd Jan to 28th Mar)

A group of churches in the London Borough of Bexley come together each winter to provide overnight accommodation, hot meals, help and support. At this stage, the Shelter's resources and available venues limit us to making spaces available only to homeless men who, often through no fault of their own, find themselves sleeping rough on the streets and roads of the borough during the months of January to March.

Each shelter is run by volunteers and finances are accumulated through the very generous gifts and grants from individuals, churches and other organisations. The running of the shelter is overseen and organised by a steering committee and a group of Trustees.

We also work alongside <u>Housing Justice</u> a national organisation and <u>Cornerstone</u>, a local charity which undertakes our guest assessments. We have a comprehensive range of policies covering all aspects of running such a project and engaging with volunteers and guests as well as the appropriate insurance cover.

Bexley Winter Shelter is not a "drop-in" centre and anyone wishing to access the venues is required to attend an assessment which is carried out by our partner charity, **Cornerstone**. This ensures that the guest is likely to be happy at the venues and that Bexley Winter Shelter is able to meet a guest's needs.

Volunteers are women and men who have a heart for the homeless and are willing to give up a few hours a week for some 12 weeks to serve and help our guests. All volunteers must first attend a two hour training session as this ensures continuity and that each evening is run to the same standards and rules. Amongst our volunteers we seek Team Leaders and Cooks (who must have a current level 2 Food Hygiene certificate) for each venue and they will undergo additional training.

The evening shift runs 6.15 pm to 10.30 pm, and welcomes guests, prepares and serve the meal and sets out the bedding.

There is a small over-night shift 10.15pm to 6.30am.

The morning shift covers 6.15am until 8.45 am. and prepares breakfast, sees the guests on their way for the day and tidies up.

This year Emmanuel is supporting the Bexley Winter Shelter as our Christmas Charity with money from the Christmas Card Tree, Retiring collections from Carols by Candlelight and the Christmas Day service and all monies donated at coffee on Sundays and Fridays during December.



A Methodist Heritage Chapel in Sussex

Winchelsea Methodist Chapel is one of the few remaining Chapels in which John Wesley preached. The Church is still in use although regular services are no longer held, but the Friends of Winchelsea Church organise monthly events and hold special services. It is a small gem with a special atmosphere of peace. Wesley first visited Winchelsea in 1772 and the townspeople were so impressed with his preaching that a preaching house, known as Even's Chapel was built on land provided by a supporter whose name was Evens.

Wesley preached in the Chapel in 1789. The pulpit he preached from still remains in the building. When he returned a year later so many people wanted to hear him he preached outdoors under an ash tree. The tree became known as Wesley's tree and when the tree fell, a cutting from the tree was planted. There is a commemorative service beneath the tree every July. Wesley died six months after preaching outdoors under the tree.

In 1851 William Forster, Winchelsea Chapel's steward recorded 30 attending in the morning, 50 in the afternoon and 60 in the evening. These numbers encouraged the building of a new chapel in a more central location, with the help of well connected benefactors. The old preaching house was put up for sale. Fortunately there were no buyers, so it was used as a Sunday School room and thankfully preserved.

After the 2nd world war attendances declined and eventually the new chapel was sold and later demolished with the proceeds being used to restore the old preaching house. This continued to be used as a place of worship but as numbers gradually went down the circuit took over responsibility for the use and maintenance of the building and so The Friends of Winchelsea Methodist Chapel was set up ensuring the Chapel continues as a place where God can be met, as well as a museum.

In recent years the floor of the Chapel was exposed, and treated with five coats of varnish to enhance the look and feel of the interior. As part of the floor was lifted it was

found that the floor was supported by old ship's masts, which having been soaked with tar were fully intact, a real example of recycling.

Unfortunately the Chapel cannot be open all the time for visits but special Open days are advertised. Tony and I visited on Heritage weekend in September.

Winchelsea is a beautiful small Sussex town with an interesting history. Once it was one of the busiest ports in the country. Although it appears quiet today there is much evidence of its importance in medieval times. The town was created by Edward I in1288 as a replacement for Old Winchelsea which existed on a low lying spit of land which disappeared under the sea at the end of the 13th century. It is a charming place to explore and enjoy.

The Hastings Embroidery in Rye

What a wonderful exhibition we enjoyed during our visit to Sussex in September. The Hastings Embroidery was being displayed in Rye after being in storage for over fifty years. Only two panels remain on display in Hastings Town Hall today. The magnificent tapestry was created by 22 ladies of the Royal College of Needlework and was commissioned to celebrate the 900th anniversary of the Battle of Hastings in 1966. The embroidery was conceived by war hero, Group Captain Ralph Bagshaw Ward and it was he who chose the events it depicts. When it was made it was on display in Hastings Town Hall and later on the pier and then put into storage. This year it came to a suitable venue near Rye harbour for a short time before it went back into storage. It was only on view for a few selected weekends between May and October.

The tapestry consists of 27 panels depicting major events in British history from 1066 to 1966. It took the embroiderers 10 months to complete. It is worked in applique by hand, with the addition of couched threads and cords, tweeds from Scotland, fabrics from the Victoria and Albert Museum and feathers from London Zoo. It is in bright, vibrant colours, 24 5 ft long, depicting over 80 significant events in British history. The quality of the needlework is breathtaking. It is a modern day equivalent of the Bayeux Tapestry.


