Dear friends,

As I write the papers are saying 'Christmas is cancelled this year'. What a dreadful thought! And now the recent lockdown makes us worry who can be in our bubble or whether we are going to spend Christmas alone.

Of course, the real Christmas is never cancelled and that is a great relief for the whole world. Like many ministers I am at home this year, shut in my study answering emails, doing Zoom meetings and making phone calls. It's a very different type of ministry we are engaged in. We need to remember Christ's coming more this year maybe than at any other time.

Friends have said they cannot wait to put up decorations: the sparkle and ribbons, the lights piercing the darkness of a December afternoon, the hope of presents and a great big tree all lit up. In truth, this year we *really* need Jesus. We need the Lord to give us hope where we have lost it.

It always seems amazing to me that God should choose a helpless baby to pierce the darkness of the Roman empire and the hardness of humanity's hearts. But God did. A baby who has come for over 2,019 years and will come to us again this year – despite a pandemic. We may choose the tinsel and sparkle of Christmas, but Christ chooses our hearts.

Dear friends,

I have been asked to share a bit about myself, so here goes:

I was born in Cuckfield, West Sussex. We were living close to my grandparents who lived in Hassocks. They went to Hassocks Congregational Church while my parents went to a little Anglican church in our village. Apart from 2 years in America, I have spent most of my life in Oxfordshire or Sussex, though I have moved about 17 times in total.

Letter From Our URC Interim Moderator

This is a "two C" letter. The first C is "Covid". Can I hear a groan? Not again.

We are well aware of the devastation caused by coronavirus. Fifty thousand deaths in our country relate to the pandemic. In such situations the cry goes up from many people who are presently asking, "Why is this happening" or "Where is God in all of this?"

Christians believe that Jesus is fully divine and fully human. Yet we sometimes overlook the second part - the fact that Jesus lived on this soil for thirty-three years and suffered a most horrendous death.

Jesus lived in a world of perpetual illness. Jodi Magness, in her book about daily life in first-century Galilee - "Stone and Dung, Oil and Spit", calls that environment "filthy, malodorous and unhealthy." A case of the flu, bad cold or even an abscessed tooth could kill. This was Jesus's world. Thankfully not ours in 2020.

Let us find comfort in knowing that when we pray to Jesus we are praying to someone who understands - not only because He is divine but is human and experienced a life so fundamental and dangerous that even those presently living in the most sparse conditions on earth could not comprehend. It puts these frightening present times into perspective.

Jesus continually sought out those who were sick. Most of His so called miracles correlated healing to illnesses and disabilities. Debilitating skin conditions (under the rubric of "leprosy"), epilepsy, blindness, deafness and paralysis were only a sample. When Jesus saw a person in need, the Gospels tell us that His heart was "moved with pity" as related in Mark 6, 31 -34.

Let us imagine a battle between God and the virus. Is the virus winning? It has shut down churches, some of which will never open again. I know of two United Reformed churches in the South London area which have already closed. It is the NHS, not God, that heals. This is our new faith. The old religion of God has become an archaic irrelevance to many.

The British Social Attitudes (BSA) survey is published annually. It tracks changes in British social opinions and behaviour and is widely used by business and Government to direct future policy. In 2018 25% of those surveyed very sadly agreed with the statement "I do not believe in God". That number increases with each passing year.

Friedrich Nietzsche famously proclaimed, "God is dead", to express his idea that the Enlightenment had eliminated the possibility of the existence of God. Sadly Nietzsche's statement is becoming more relevant to a larger sector of the UK population.

So 25% of the UK population don't believe in God but a number of them are asking where God presently resides during this crisis. Rather hypocritical don't you think?

It is so sad to follow the graph of those dying from the virus. People could argue that it teaches the world a lesson but others could argue that He is not all-loving. They don't comprehend God. God sent His Son to earth for our benefit. He wished His Son to suffer for our benefit. He tolerated His Son to be vilified and humiliated beyond imagination for our benefit. Yet many still blame God for Covid.

The truth is no one really knows the answer but God. One thing we do know for certain, though, is that God hasn't abandoned us. Multiple promises in the Bible tell us that He will never forsake or leave us in our time of need. He is still walking by us; helping us get through this terrible time.

Where is God? God is right with us.

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I have already briefly mentioned that many do not believe and are asking where God (and Jesus) is at present. Now I turn to the second "C", Christmas. There are so many overlays of trivia nowadays that the TRUE message can be hard to find. Problem is that many never find it. Many do not even try. Worse still - many do not know where to look.

The trend is moving strongly towards a disassociation of the birth of Jesus with Christmas. But first let us take another look at one story irrevocably linked with Christmas - concerning the Star. Much controversy has arisen around this star which the Magi followed (if you believe) and were supposed to follow (to the unbelievers).

Unless you are blatantly biased (and in serious research that is a heinous crime) you must keep a balanced view. Can astrologers prove that a "bright star" shone around that time? Witnessing Biblical scrutiny it seems to me that most researchers begin on a blatantly biased premise. Stories told about this birth are a load of claptrap and all wrong.

So when we read this passage, "we have seen His star in the east" is it a figment of the gospel writer's imagination derived from another source? Very sophisticated software has tracked the path of stars and planets over the past centuries. The beauty of such an exercise is predictability. Early astrologers (Magi) could produce a very accurate line by tracking such heavenly bodies. If modern navigators could track a very fine line from the stars why could the Magi have failed to do otherwise? That was their stock-in-trade.

In 2BC the conjunction of Jupiter and Venus would have created a *very bright star* at that time. Until now it was assumed that they approached but never actually crossed. So this star is actually the combined light from two planets but to the naked eye from earth it would appear as one. So we have very strong proof that a very bright star existed in 2 BC.

But no. They are still at it. As this star did not appear around 25th December commentators suggest that our "Christmas time" was not the birth of Jesus. There has never been any evidence to suggest that Jesus was born on December 25th. No one knows when He was born.

There is a saying which goes "you cannot have your cake and eat it!" Very true. What do people want? Do they want to accept all the stories which are circulated around the complete myth of Jesus and refuse to believe any which support His birth?

Jesus didn't have a birth certificate – not, at least in the format with which we are familiar in the U.K.. That is faith - to believe in something of which we have no definite proof.

How often have you called to Jesus for support? Have you felt His presence very real on certain occasions - usually in stress and grief?

Now transfer these thoughts to others in Emmanuel. Do you think that they have had the same thoughts and experiences? Of course they have. Now enlarge this to Christians everywhere. And add all the non-Christians when the need was there. The buck had stopped. The door had been firmly closed. There was no one else to whom to turn. Yes, we are now covering hundreds of millions of people. And we are only dealing with those who are alive at this present time.

Then stop and stand back. Ask yourself why are so many trying to break down Christmas and Christianity. I have no wish to degenerate Marks & Spencer. It has enough troubles at present. But take out "Christ" from "Christmas" and all that is left is "M&S". Is this concept worth celebrating? I will finish at this point but I leave you to ponder over that point in the days that lead up to our Saviour's birth.

So let me wish you and your family a most blessed Christmas. Let us hope that "Covid" is a much forgotten word in 2021. Let us wish that more will come to unearth the true meaning of Christmas in 2020.


A Prayer for Advent

<u>"To Everything There is a Season, and a Time</u><u>to Every Purpose Under Heaven " (Ecclesiastes 3:1)</u>

When we first became aware of this pandemic it was Springtime and the golden daffodils were flowering in the garden. On the trees the buds were ready to burst into leaf. The grass had started growing again after the cold Winter. Out in the fields the crops were shooting through the brown fertile soil. The blossom was beginning to open on the fruit trees.

Winter had passed and the welcome signs of Spring gave us something to look forward. Little did we know how our daily lives were about to change in so many ways.

Whilst we were out walking recently and noticing how the trees were changing, I began to think about the seasons and how they have changed over the last few months. We have been preoccupied coping with the restrictions which Coronavirus has inflicted on us. Thankfully, nature has continued to take care of our world.

We are dependent on voluntary donations to raise approx. 85% of our annual £490,000 budget. Without your support we would be unable to offer the services we do. Any help you can give, financially or practically (food or men's clothing) throughout the year, will benefit some of the poorest members of our society.

Since our last AGM we sadly have to report the deaths of three members – Rosemary Patterson, Josie Corcoran and Dorothy Limeburner. These ladies had not all been able to attend for a while but had been long standing members at Emmanuel. Happily we have two positive items to report. We were delighted to formally welcome Elsie Goodman into membership at Emmanuel, and some members were able to attend the wedding of Ella Izzard and Joe Stone when they were married at Emmanuel on 1st January. The service was conducted by Alison.

Lettings

Until the first lockdown in March bookings were running at a comparable rate to the previous year earning just short of £10,000 in that period. Lettings then stopped abruptly and completely until that lockdown ended. Thereafter there was a trickle of bookings as a few groups returned. This again all but stopped when the second lockdown was announced at the end October. At the time of writing just three groups satisfying government exemptions continue to hire. In the time since the original lockdown just £1700 has been earned, meaning the annual lettings income for the year will be approximately half that earned in the previous twelve months.

We have endeavoured to meet all the Government restrictions whilst continuing to be available for support groups and other allowable activities. We have written a risk assessment and action plan to mitigate against the Covid risks with which all hirers must comply. This has necessitated limiting the number attending meetings and applying strict hygiene requirements. All groups are expected to sanitise equipment before use in addition to our regular in-house cleaning regime.

One of the AA groups is continuing to meet and we have provided desperately needed accommodation for music examinations. We have also let one room as a temporary office and have taken on a new after-school group. Most of our original hirers are keen to return but are reluctant to do so bearing in mind susceptibility of their membership. We will keep their time slots available until we pass through this current cloud.

The current situation can be expected to continue well into next spring when the hope of a vaccine may encourage groups to return. So hopefully next year's lettings income may match this year's before getting back to 'normal' in 2021 -2022.

The last external repainting (which was only the Manse side of the Hall) appears to have been in 2012. We should probably have both

buildings repainted next summer.

The internal walls in the front porch of the Hall are showing signs Damp of damp but it is proving very difficult to determine where it is

coming from.

The kitchen area in the Church needs attention due to a water leak Internal

causing rot in the under-sink cupboard.

The Church heating could perhaps be improved with a room thermostat in preference to the thermostatic radiator valves.






Friday Coffee Mornings


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Parent and Toddler Group
