Letter from the Interim Moderator

But I hear of at least three ministers who will be retiring in early 2022. There must be others. So we have optimistic grounds for hope next year. One of the three is our good friend Raymond Singh. He was a member of the Pastoral team who examined our Profile when we met them via Zoom. I have known Raymond for many years. As an ordinand he applied for the vacancy in my own church. Sadly he was unsuccessful. He would have been much, much better than the minister we eventually got! But we keep hoping. Maybe I will have more positive news in the March newsletter.

So now to move on to consider Christmas. Pam and I share home responsibilities and, in the main, it works very well. One of my tasks is to write all our Christmas cards. It is our practice to send only religious cards with a Christmas message. But this year it is nigh on impossible to buy such a card. Christmas must have more meaningless symbols attached to it than any other celebration!

A little game. Which of the following are real and which are false?

Terrorist sends letter bomb. Post Office returns it. Forgets he sent it. Opens it and blows himself up.

Woman noticed a car in front with the sticker "Honk if you love Jesus". She honked. The driver got out of the car and smashed her windscreen and bonnet to bits.

Groups of gypsies were taken to hospital after eating rotten horseflesh. They asked to be sent home because the hospital food was so bad they preferred to take their chances with the horsemeat!

Eminent lawyers are trying to discern whether or not to verify the claims that a baby was born to a couple who swore that they had never had intercourse.

When a deaf vicar asked the name of the child the godmother quietly said "Lucifer". He refused to accept such a name so baptised the child John. It was only afterwards that he learned that the godmother had said "Lucy, sir".

Now this will surprise you. *They are all true*. I have the bible to verify one and the Sunday Times to verify the other four. The other four stories occurred within the past five years. The one about Baby Jesus happened just over *two thousand years* ago.

And it is only right and proper that we should begin to consider His birth and its implications in the Advent season. Unlike the Spanish dramatist la Barca who said, "man's greatest crime is to have been born" we give our highest praise and thanks to the fact that Jesus was born.

Can you think of any likely stories, similar to the other four events I have mentioned, that happened two thousand years ago? No you cannot. *And you never will.* Now let us ponder over a very important topic. If the other events mentioned happened, say, fifty years previous would they still be news worthy? And the time-scale I am thinking of is nowhere in the region of two thousand years? I think most certainly not.

People continually write off the story of Jesus's birth. They just know it could not happen. They know. Sadly greater numbers disbelieve the virgin birth. I tried to find out current statistics but was unable. The story of the baby Jesus has been ridiculed and written off a hundred times more often than the late Frank Sinatra comeback concerts. An aside. I managed to spell "Sinatra" wrongly first time round but the excellent spell check on Word did *not* suggest an alternative. So much for passing fame.

So we must ask the question "why go to such lengths to tell such a story if it were not true?"

As Michael Green in his commentary states, "Christianity is concerned with what actually happened. We are not at liberty to re-write history in order to fit in with what we imagine to be likely." The real objection to the virgin birth – or the virgin conception if we wish to be precise - springs from the assumption that God cannot or does not perform miracles. *No one* who believes that God has entered our world through Jesus can make that bland assumption.

It was necessary to find a Man who was a true Man, and yet who was without sin, for the sake of our salvation.

Isn't it strange that so many people are ready to believe stories of deaf vicars, gastronomic gypsies and other very unlikely events but they flatly refuse to believe the one about the Baby Jesus? We already have one miracle birth - that of John the Baptist. Why spoil the story by introducing another? There is absolutely no need for it. Of course if it was true then it is only correct and proper to establish it.

But let me ask you a question. What would you feel if you had painstakingly written a *really serious book* about a particular theme? Subject matter that you had spent a long time researching to ensure that all your facts were authenticated? Then find that your peers are laughing at your efforts. What would you feel? If you have any doubts at all what would you do? I know what I would do. I would simply ignore it and

pass on to the next chapter. Why dwell on it and risk the chance of either being found out as a fool or looked down upon as a charlatan.

Because it is true that all lies eventually come out. Consider Sir Cyril Burt and his work on IQ. The books were cooked but the truth came out in the end. Previous assumptions based on Burt's studies had to be revised. Science in general and behavioural genetics in particular were profoundly harmed by Burt's fabrication of data.

We know that Jesus is the Son of God. The miraculous event of the birth of Jesus who was destined to change the world. And change it He did. And what of the future? He will go on changing it and go on changing so many lives for the better. That is the Son whose birth we shall be celebrating later this month. The Son of God. How could His birth be otherwise?

May I wish you and all your family every blessing from God over the Christmas season.

COVID-19 dogs in the field

We are thrilled that a team of our COVID-19 detection dogs are now training in the field, as part of the second phase of our project.

They are operating a rapid Screen and Test strategy at places with large numbers of people such as workplaces. This means that only those indicated as positive by the dogs require a confirmatory PCR test, resulting in far fewer individuals needing testing.

The dogs screen lines of people or single individuals, depending on the footfall at the site, and each person takes only a brief moment. The dogs sniff the air around the person, who can keep walking if no indication is made, adding no time or inconvenience to their journey. If a dog does detect the odour of COVID19, a very clear "stand", "sit" or "follow" indication is made, so the trainer knows they need to gently ask that person to step to one side and talk them through the next steps – to ask if they are willing to be consented on our study and seek a COVID-19 PCR test to confirm the dogs' indication.

Some individuals who are screened negative by the dogs are randomly selected to be asked if they would take part in our trial as a control to confirm their negative status. As soon as all of the trial data is collected, we will be moving forward to a fully operational service.

A Birthday Walk for Remembrance

There is a wonderful charity called Scotty's Little Soldiers which is dedicated to supporting bereaved British Forces' children and young people. It was started up by Nikki Scott whose husband, Lee, was killed in Afghanistan in 2009. Seeing the effect of Lee's death on her two children inspired Nikki to set up the charity in 2010. The charity's mission is "to provide relief from the effects of bereavement to young people who have experienced the death of a parent who served with the Armed Forces of the Crown."

On 12th November, Kerry Irving, the owner of Max the Miracle dog. (featured in the previous Outlook edition) set out with two of his dogs to do a 16 mile Remembrance walk marking the 3rd birthday of his youngest dog Harry, but more importantly raising money to support Scotty's Little Soldiers.

Kerry said "I'm walking in aid of Scotty's Little Soldiers because they do an absolutely fantastic job in supporting these children. At such a young age they have been through so much and I know what a difficult time of the year Remembrance can be. It's important that we remember, remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice, but also the children our heroes left behind".

The 16-mile walk is a long and difficult but beautiful walk. However, on this occasion the weather made it even harder. It rained continually all day long! Kerry had fitted a GPS tracker to one dog, enabling us to follow their journey on an online map from the comfort of our home.

The walk started at 8 o'clock from outside St John's Church in Keswick It went over Walla Crag, on to Watendlath, down to the village of Rosthwaite before climbing up to the summit of Catbells.

On a fine day it is a wonderful walk but on this occasion the conditions were very challenging. However, never once did Kerry think of abandoning the walk despite torrential rain and strong winds. It was one of the toughest walks he had ever done. His thoughts had been with the children he was supporting. throughout the walk. The two dogs, Paddy and Harry, who are well used to the Cumbrian fells were fine. They probably covered twice the distance!

During the eight hours the walk took, we had been following the route on the computer. We had observed the climb up to Watendlath and later on to Catbells. As the three made their way through the marketplace we put our waterproofs on and went out to join their loyal band of supporters to welcome them back. Max, who is 14 years old, had stayed at home, and was overjoyed to be reunited with his master and his brothers. When asked if he was exhausted, Kerry responded with "I'm fine!" I wonder how he felt the next morning?

What an achievement!

As I write this story the total of money raised is £35,146.

Emmanuel Church is excited to bring to the Church again Messy Church!!

We held our first Messy Church after 20 months due to Covid19 restrictions. How wonderful it was to declare "We are back".

Our Messy Angels met on the 1st September to discuss the feasibility of restarting on the 9th October as the feedback we were getting from some of our Messy Parents was, very sensibly, a reluctance to attend overcrowded venues with their young families.

To make it as safe as possible we set in place a program to restrict the number of children to 20 and only have 1 parent per family. To do this we needed to introduce an online booking system for parents to book a week in advance of the meeting. We would limit the number of craft tables to 5 instead of our previous 7. Food was a problem so we agreed that we would make up food parcels of shop packaged items like biscuits, cake, crisps, fruit and a bottled drink. Tea and coffee would be available for adults. We also decided to shorten the meeting to $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours instead of 2 hours to allow for deep cleaning before and after the event.

The theme of our meeting was to be "New Beginnings". Our crafts were to be 1, Twiggy the Hedgehog, 2, Memories of everyone in face masks, 3, Noah's Ark, 4, Celery fish and 5, Rockets to the future.

We held our breaths and opened the online booking service on the 2nd October and all 20 places were booked within a few days.

What a wonderful time we all had. The feedback was all good with just a few comments that the food could have been a bit healthier for the children, which we took on board.

We had a planning meeting and de-brief on the 13th October and the enthusiasm of our Angels was infectious, with everyone thrilled with the outcome of our first post pandemic Messy Church meeting and the ideas for our next Messy meeting on the 13th November came in thick and fast. The theme would be "Remembrance"

We decided to increase the number of children to 25 to avoid too many disappointments but still just 1 parent per family. We would still have shop packaged food but look for healthier options.

13th November 2021 Theme "Remembrance"

Our idea was to make the children aware of and Remember our War Dead and Animal Suffering but also to have a bit of fun as it was co close to Firework Night.

We should have had just 25 pre-booked children this month, but 2 families came in through the side door, making an extra 5 children, not having booked, but fortunately 2 children who were booked in failed to turn up. We had made up 28 Goody Bags for the children so there was just enough to go around.

We hate to turn anyone away but Covid19 is not going away anytime soon and we must try and keep everyone safe, which is why we make the rules of prebooking, only allowing 1 adult per family and that adult to wear a face mask. We thoroughly clean beforehand and make sure there are adequate cleaning facilities and anti-bac gel. We will have to make sure the side door is locked next month.

Our Giant Table was a drawing of our church and a large spy glass looking down on all the people going into the church. Everyone was encouraged to take part in decorating this collage.

Our Craft Tables were set out to promote the word \underline{PEACE} , so \underline{P} was for Poppies and the children finger painted fields of beautiful red flowers with black centres. \underline{E} was for Emmanuel Church and they made some wonderful "Stained Glass Windows" to put up in the church or take home.

A was for Animals especially horses that suffered so badly in the 1st World War, so we had the children create a horse with moving legs and flying mane. $\underline{\mathbf{C}}$ was for Cross to remember, made of cardboard with a very realistic Poppy on it made from red and black tissue paper. The last letter $\underline{\mathbf{E}}$ was for Explosions and the children had black card with lots of brightly coloured paint to brush on to make their very own Firework Display

We knew that we were going to be very short of Messy Angels this month but we just about managed. What is it they say? With a bit of luck and a following wind. Phew!

Come and join our happy band of Angels. It is hard work but the reward is worth it just to see the look of absolute pleasure on a child's face as they concentrate on creating their Masterpiece.

Peace and Positivity

On a recent visit to Cumbria, a peaceful walk in the Wythop valley led us through the village of Embleton. There, in an isolated location we came across the Church of St Cuthberts. The Church door was open and welcomed us into a haven of peace and tranquillity. Our eyes were attracted to a beautiful quilt hanging on one of the walls and labelled Peace and Positivity. It had been created by members of the Church community during the period of lockdown. What an inspiration!

The present Church dates from 1806, although Christians have worshipped there since at least 1210AD. Restoration was carried out between 1883 and 1892. It is a small church seating only 75 people but holding regular services. St Cuthberts is part of the Binsey Mission Community within the diocese of Carlisle. The Church is situated in the midst of a farming community surrounded by some beautiful scenery.

Peace and Positivity is a community project begun in March 2021 during the third lockdown of covid 19 pandemic and completed in August of the same year. The Positive or Plus or Cross design (known by quilters as a 'block') was chosen as a universal and inclusive symbol. The main reason for choosing that particular block was that it represented a positive and hopeful look to the future. It is also easy to make - that was important so that nonsewers in the community could contribute.

One hundred and four blocks were made. They are arranged to show darkness moving into light; the dark times of the pandemic moving to better times.

The dove was added as an ancient and universal symbol of peace.

Once completed the intention was for the quilt to also be a reference to the losses and memories of the pandemic.

Included on the wall-hanging is the cross of St Cuthbert and a reference to the floor tiles of the church. Those of you with good eyesight will also see another positive symbol in the border.



The Manna Society

Thank you for Emmanuel Church's Harvest Festival gifts to the Manna Centre. The food that we have received will be used throughout the next twelve months to provide meals to some of the poorest members of our society.

Due to the restrictions placed on us by the Coronavirus outbreak, we have had to limit our normal services. Since July 2020 we have been providing approximately 120 daily takeaway meals, consisting of a hot dinner and a sandwich to anyone who is homeless or in need. A sign that things are improving is that from Monday 21st June 2021, we have been able to allow 15 socially distanced rough sleepers back into the centre to access food, toilet and washing facilities from 8am to 9.30am. Our takeaway meal and clothing services continue to operate from 10.30am to 1.00pm, 7 days a week.

From April last year we set up a telephone helpline, which operates, from Monday to Friday with an advice worker available to speak directly to those in need between 10am and 1pm. In August 2021 we helped 78 clients via this service. A more detailed report giving a brief synopsis of what we achieved and the issues that arose can be found at www.mannasocietv.org.uk/2020/04/13/telephone-helpline-weekly-reports/

In addition to our telephone helpline, we are also seeing clients face to face (or at least via laptops) in the centre itself. This is by appointment only. In August, 65 clients were assisted via this service. Again, more information about this service can be found at the above webpage.

The work we do here is a practical and compassionate response to poverty and homelessness. The majority of our funding and our foodstuffs come from the Christian community. Without the continuing generosity of our supporters, we would be unable to continue our work.

We are dependent on voluntary donations to raise approx. 85% of our annual budget. Without your support we would be unable to offer the services we do. Any help you can give, financially or practically (food or men's clothing) throughout the year, will benefit some of the poorest members of our society.
