

Message from the Minister

Dear Friends,

Despite having just come back from a week's break I find myself struggling to write this piece. I have lots of thoughts / ideas / issues crowding in. I could tell you about the lovely walk I had among the almond blossom in part of the Finca Galatzo, a book I picked up recently, The Bible from Scratch, the complexities of trying to manage my diary and assist my parents.

None of these, although all worthwhile and interesting seem to be developing into a full blown minister's letter yet the dead line looms.

One thing that has struck me since I've been back is our media's obsession with Brexit. It was very pleasant while away not to hear the word or be continually bombarded with comments and speculation. Yes I know that we are only a month away from the 29th March but at times it seems to me that it is the only news item, which means that we can become very inward looking and insular.

Whatever our views on our decision to leave the European Union, I hope that we will continue to discuss honestly and openly and treat all with respect however much we might disagree with their views. There are times when I have found that hard with the intransigence of some of our politicians.

While I was away, I listened to a sermon based on Jesus' calming of the waves on the Sea of Galilee. The preacher picked up on Jesus' words "Where is your faith?" pointing out that it wasn't in his view a criticism of the disciples or of us. Those words are a reminder that when life is chaotic and threatening we, as people of faith, have God to trust in, rely on not to take away the troubles or the difficulties but to enable us to live through them in faith and trust.

That seems to me to be a very pertinent message in these uncertain times and as we look to the start of Lent and the journey to the cross.

At the risk of being boring I would like to thank our wonderful band of Angels who put so much time and effort and love into making our monthly meetings so enjoyable for the many young families from our community that attend.

We had 27 children with their parents, grandparents and guardians and what a wonderful time we all had.

Our Giant Resolution Wreath was a great success with a drawing of the world surrounded by cut outs of everyone's hands stuck on – the idea being to write a new years promise on each hand. It didn't work out quite that way, but the thought was there.

New Year – New Pet: A coloured in template of a favourite animal stuck onto a large lolly stick after being coloured in – much easier to look after than a real pet.

Tasty, healthy Smoothies: A variety of Smoothies were made up in advance for the children and parents to taste and try to guess what the ingredients were – great fun was had by all.

Piggy Biscuits: As it's nearly the Chinese New Year we had some cakes decorated by the children with the shape of a pig made from icing sugar and some sweets stuck on to give piggy a lovely snout.

Happy New Year Bunting: What a lot of effort was put into this with pictures in the shape of 2019 and the three wise men on their journey to Bethlehem.

New Year – New Hat: A paper plate and paper bowl fixed together ready for the children to decorate to their own design with a mixture of coloured feathers, shredded tissue paper and lots of sparkly things – beautiful.

A Winter Scene: Blue card with the picture of a bare tree on it was given to the children to add white paint as snow and finished off with a calendar to stick on and some raffia to hang it up with. Brrr! It makes you feel cold just looking at the beautiful results.

Whilst everyone went out to the Green Room to hear a story about promises, to sing a song and to say their prayers the hall was hastily prepared for a fantastic meal of jacket potatoes with grated cheese and baked beans before the children departed for home with all the wonderful things they had made.

We had some beautiful love birds created by a white bird shape and various shades of pink card were stuck on to make splendid looking birds.

We had a table for the children to make and personalise their own Love Mobile with messages of love stuck on to wool and string. I bet most of these will now be hanging from the children's bedroom ceilings.

We made some wonderful bird feeders by bending pipe cleaners into heart shapes and then threading on Cheerios ready to be hung up outside for the birds to feast on.

Last but not least, we had a junk table where the children and parents could let their imaginations run riot by creating, rockets, planes, ships, castles, swords etc. etc. out of all our recycling and stuff that would normally end up in landfill – WOW – Our future engineers.



Doris Willson, has been in hospital following a fall at home but is now back in her flat supported by her family and carers.


In your prayers please remember Maureen Howlett and her husband Syd who is undergoing a course of treatment at present.

Uprooted and overlooked

Stand up for the millions of people forced from their homes worldwide

Two-thirds of people forced from home are still in their own country. Seeking safety but unwilling or unable to leave, they are denied the official protection given to refugees.

The reasons for their displacement are many: conflict, flooding, drought, fear. Torn from their homes, their families and their communities, displaced people are among the most vulnerable to poverty and exploitation in the world.

At Christian Aid, we believe each one of us deserves respect and care. We believe all people should be protected from harm and have a chance to rebuild their lives.

The countries of the Global North are failing poorer communities by neglecting their responsibility to support displaced people.

Many of the world's displaced remain hidden or ignored.

What are we calling for?

The UN and its member states are working on two new agreements on refugees and migration, but these do nothing to support the 40 million people displaced within their own borders.

We believe that any deal that does not include internally displaced people would be a huge failure. We want the UN and its member states to agree to work towards a FAIR solution that is:

Funded for the long-term.

Ambitious enough to match the scale of the problem.

Inclusive, by protecting all people forced from home, including internally displaced people.

Respectful of rights and other international law so that people are not unfairly discriminated against.

The UK Government is a major donor to the UN's humanitarian system, and a permanent member of the UN Security Council. It can therefore play a vital role in creating such a deal.

We're calling on the UK Government to ensure no one is left behind in the UN negotiations and to support better protection for all displaced people.

Samira's Story

Samira fled her village when Boko Haram attacked.


She was forced to make a horrific journey for many miles in search of safety, eventually reaching Maiduguri – but four of the children in her care died along the way. Samira experienced horrific violence, enduring and seeing things that no person should ever have to go through.

Samira has witnessed the worst of humanity. Although she is now safe, the loss of the children she was caring for and the scars of her ordeal make this of little comfort to her.

Christian Aid envelopes will be distributed in **church**. Please give generously to help people like Samira.
