

Letter from the Interim Moderator

And still nothing to report. To be honest August is a dead month so it is really too much to expect any announcements on our vacancy. But September. Now that could be different. The Moderator told us "some months" but that was six months ago already so I think we are due a message sometime soon.

This quarter I would like to dwell on a word that has largely disappeared from our normal vocabulary - sin. It's a word that many in modern Britain prefer not to mention. It has all the connotations of evil and wrong-doing which so many people do not want to be reminded of nowadays. A deliberate lie is a sin. How many of our politicians fall into this category?

When we read our Bible we come across this word at regular intervals. My Concordat records no less than *four complete columns* of the various forms of "sin" which appear in the Bible. So it crops up quite a lot. And the Bible is always quite unequivocal in its opposition to sin.

Perhaps if we look at the definition in a dictionary it may suggest why so many in 2022 Britain try to keep clear of this word. According to my Cassell Concise dictionary sin is defined as "transgression of duty, morality or the law of God; wickedness, moral depravity, a transgression, an offence, a breach of etiquette, social standards." Mark the title of the dictionary. "Concise". What would it give if it was described as an expanded dictionary!

Jesus himself tells us that we can be forgiven any sin and evil that we say Math 12.31. This does not of course mean that we can habitually sin and expect God to keep on forgiving our sins.

Look at the parody of our Christian journey through life. As Christians we hope to go to Heaven and be with God when we die. That must be the hope of every Christian and yet there is often little mention of this in sermons which I nowadays hear. But if we are to move along this road we must prepare ourselves as we go. And our aim must be to be as near as possible to have sinned less when we arrive at Heaven's gate.

Three observations about sin. Firstly sin is telling us to obey our own wishes rather than obey God's. It is fairly obvious to where it would lead if we satisfied our own desires. We put our own needs before God's. Well if that is the case are we in any way different from people who never walk in through the door of God's house? Forget about Christianity for a second. Think of the vastly miserable existence if everyone put themselves first. What a really selfish life this would be. Would you like to live in such a world? I would not.

When I came out of hospital after a hip replacement I could not climb stairs etc. Life was pretty flat at times. I had to gradually build up the muscles through therapy. Now exercise comes easy to me. Fifteen press-ups is a piece of cake. As I built up my muscles the exercises became easier. There is no doubt

that the harder we try the easier it is. As we gain control over bad habits they seem to pose less and less of a threat.

Secondly, sin is a great nullifier. It works away trying to unravel all the good which Christ has set out to do in the first place. So ask ourselves why did Christ die? John 1.29 answers that one. "To take away the sins of the world".

Thirdly, sin tries to separate us from Jesus. That is a fairly simple choice to make. We can either side with Jesus or side with the Devil (he would probably like to be called by a more user-friendly name). The choice is ours.

But this raises a far bigger question. Why does God allow this evil, this sin to be around in the first place? People worship or do not worship Him. He created us as creatures with a free will. Yes, unfortunately we have a choice. And that can be a real problem at times. Think for a moment if God had never allowed evil to come into the world. What choice would we have had? We were found out doing something we should not. We were about to tell a lie to try to cover up. What would have been God's reaction? To close up our mouth before the lie had left our lips.

It would also be one where all choice was taken away from us. We would simply be no better or worse than programmed bots. We could do what we jolly well fancied knowing that God would suddenly put on the brakes when we were about to venture into sin. The word "temptation" would lose all semblance of a threat. It would refrain from posing any problems to us. We would not have to worry. God would do it all for us. I would certainly not like to lead a life like that.

This was why God sent his Son to die on our behalf. He meets evil in death and resurrection. He then transcends evil by grace and love. God wants everyone to turn to Him but He had to give them the initial choice.

Think of the words of Ephesians 4, 31-32. "Get rid of all bitterness, passion and anger. No more hateful feelings. Be kind and tender-hearted to one another and forgive one another as God has forgiven you through Christ." Powerful words but words which we must heed and try to obey if we are to go out of our way to remove as much sinful thought as possible from our lives.

But here is the bonus. Who is on the Lords side? As the hymn goes. We are. But far more important is the fact that the Lord is on our side. The struggle may not seem very fair and it is not. Because with God on our side the struggle is really unequal. He is far superior in all ways to the one who sins. That is why it is so important to keep on reminding ourselves that the closer we keep in contact with Jesus the easier it is for us.

We have also been trying out some restaurants, an odious task as you can imagine, but someone has to do it. We have had family visiting us which has been lovely and I am so thankful for the telephone so I can keep in touch with my friends in Sidcup. We do miss everyone from Sidcup but we know that

moving here was the right thing to do, and we are very happy. Should anyone be visiting the area at any time do call and we can meet up.



Dear Friends,

Is anyone back to normal?

After two years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can now worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its likely effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK. Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13 v.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and those churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (*if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do – it helps your treasurer significantly*) may have seen a 20%+ drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the M&M Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure the M&M Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000 (less than one-half of one percent of income), a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.

Again, thank you all!



OBERAMMAGAU 2022

An unsolicited travel brochure falls through the letter box in 2019. I flicked through it noting that a visit to the most famous performance of the Passion Play is one of the trips. Is it on my bucket list? - yes - so phone a Jewish friend (who was delighted to join me even though she does not recognise Jesus as the Messiah) and book for July 2020. Then Covid struck the world. Delayed for 2 years!! So at last in July 2022 we fly to Munich, bus to Austria - Innsbruck Neuschwanstein Castle (think Chitty Chitty Bang Bang) and Oberammagau in the Bavarian Alps.

History During the 1618-48 30 years war (Catholics v Protestants) the plague (black death) was rampant. Oberammagau isolated itself restricting movements to and from the village with guards. Kaspar Schisler who had been working away crept back to his family in the village unwittingly bring the disease

with him. In the next few months he, his family and 84 inhabitants died. This was thought a punishment from God so in 1633 as an act of penitence and expression of faith the Village Council made a solemn vow to perform every 10th year a play of the Saviours suffering and death if they were delivered from the disease. No one else died. The first performance was 1674. In 1674 the date was changed to the beginning of each decade. No performance in 1700 (ban on passion plays) and 1940 (WW2). The only other postponement was 1920 (Spanish flu pandemic) but performed in 1922.

Oberammagau. Surrounded by mountains, many houses are decorated with frescoes from the bible eg Pilates house (1784) or from fairy tales eg Hansel and Gretel, Red Riding Hood. There are 60 woodcarvers in the village and their work is amazing.

May - October 5 days a week 4,500 people fill the purpose built covered theatre (until 1830 performed in the cemetery). The roof over the stage is retractable. During the play season nearly 45,000 visitors from 40 different countries visit the village. The village population is 5,400 of whom 2,500 are involved in the production – acting, scenery, costumes, props, catering, coach driving etc. Actors may need unpaid leave or as with our bus driver who ferried us back to the hotel juggle both roles – he had been a villager 20 minutes previously and was also the real father of the actor playing Caiaphas. The play is a family affair. To have a part you need to be born in the village or live there 20 years. If you marry someone born in the village you need only wait 10 years. There are auditions for all parts. People from all faiths can take part. From Ash Wednesday the year before the play the Hair Decree comes into operation no man with a part can shave or have a haircut until the final performance in October the following year (unless they are playing a Roman Soldier who were traditionally clean shaven). There are 2 complete casts – performing alternate days. In the Palm Sunday act there maybe 500 people on the stage including animals - donkey, sheep, horses, children, babies. The cloth for the costumes are sourced in India who make the material as it was in Jesus' time. Villagers make all the costumes.

Over the years the play has evolved. Changes of script have occurred. Music was composed by Dedler (born in Oberammagau) for the 1820 production. New music has been added as changes in script occurred. In 1811 special living tableaux were introduced - 18 scenes from the OT reflecting Jesus' journey through his last days. When you see them its hard to realise they are real people.

Part 1 is in the afternoon, a break for dinner – prebooked -and then Part 2 in the evening. It is performed in German (English texts are available) and follows the story of Jesus from his entry into Jerusalem through to the crucifixion and the resurrection.

Words cannot describe what an amazing spectacle this passion play is reflecting the time of Jesus and bringing the story to life - the acting, the music, choirs and soloists. It was brilliant.


