Message From the Minister

Dear Friends.

The story of our lives can be written in linear time: time passing, years going by and accumulating. But our lives are also part of a cyclical time: the clock that ticks and brings us back to the same time every 24 hours, the week that brings us back to the same day, and the year that brings us back to the same month. As we watch time pass, see ourselves grow older and lose something we will never regain, sadness can take hold of our minds. The tradition of the Church offers a response to this. When cycles return, new beginnings are celebrated. This is true of the beginning of the year, which coincides with the Nativity of Christ, spring, which coincides with the Resurrection, and—a recent addition to the tradition—the celebration of Creation in September. This liturgical season is not old. It is becoming widespread in churches around the world. It is gaining momentum as awareness of the ecological crisis grows.

Creation is a magnificent doctrine of Christianity. To be honest, it is not specific to Christianity, but Christianity has a special approach to it. All the world's religions have some kind of creation story, a story that answers the question we have all asked ourselves at one time or another: 'How did everything around us come to be?' Biblical commentators say that the creation story we find in Genesis 1 owes much to that of the Babylonians. My Old Testament professor said that it was the greatest moment of happiness in the Bible. Everything is put in place by God so that God's creatures may live happily and always flourish. The first chapter of Genesis is a peaceful text, in which there is no deception, violence, sin or murder (all of which appear on the next page...). The biblical account of Creation tells us something essential: we did not create ourselves, nor did we create the environment in which we live (even if the cities and artificial environment in which we live would have us believe otherwise...). When we look around us with the eyes of faith in the One who created us, we are filled with a single emotion: gratitude. Contemplating Creation leads us to recognise the greatness and magnificence, the power of love and goodness that created us. This emotion cancels out the sadness I mentioned in the first lines of this letter. Thus, the beginning of a new school year while celebrating Creation in September is a joyful time. Even though it tells us that a year has passed, in faith it reminds us of the importance of living in gratitude, for we are the recipients of a gift that we can never offer or return to the One who gave it to us: life.

I wish you and your families, especially the children and young people, an excellent start to the new school year.

Pastorate Update

At the Pastorate Away Day on 7th June 2025, we explored "Recommitting our Pastorate to Ecology and Going Beyond!" The presentation defined **eco-theology**, integrating the theology of creation and biblical prophetism to emphasize God's love for all creatures and the church's call for justice in ecological matters.

We discussed the church's role in public ecological debates, noting younger generations' concerns. Data highlighted **transport and food systems** as major contributors to individual carbon footprints, advocating for significant emission reductions. While individual actions like embracing plant-based diets are crucial, governmental efforts are also vital.

The ethical dimension of **animal cruelty** was addressed, drawing on theologians Andrew Linzey and David Clough, who argue for Christian compassion towards all God's creatures. A practical step proposed was CreatureKind's **Default Veg campaign**, promoting plant-based food as the default option at church events to encourage ethical and environmental choices. This engagement reflects our Reformed tradition's commitment to societal ethical debates.

Mustard Seed Relief Mission Love in a Box

Mustard Seed Charity has been operating since 1992 and sends out much needed aid to disadvantaged children and young persons in Eastern Europe.

We also run our 'Love in a Box' campaign every Christmas. This project allows schools, businesses, churches and other organisations and individuals to fill shoe boxes with gifts for the children who would otherwise not receive a Christmas present.

Each shoe box is picked up, checked, sealed and sent to the children by lorry. The lorries are met by the distribution teams where the precious gifts are given out to the children who are eagerly awaiting them. Then the fun begins as the children open the gifts.

The children always thank the distribution team and ask to say a big 'thank you' to all the kind English people who show they care.

We receive many messages from our friends in Moldova thanking us for all the hard work that goes into the Love in a Box campaign.

From the distribution of the leaflets in September to the boxes arriving in a child's hands in December there is so much hard work and goodwill. None of this would be possible without all of our kind supporters who give so much of their time and effort. As we always say, we couldn't do it without you!

Peter and Maddie's Trip to South Africa

We have been asked to pen an article for Outlook on our trip in March to Southern Africa. We initially thought of perhaps creating a quiz based on our photos of the wildlife we saw but there was just so much that it will all but fill the magazine. And, anyway, who wants to look at other people's holiday pictures? Digital cameras have a lot to answer for. So, instead, we have opted just to pick out a few illustrated highlights to give a flavour of our adventures.



We stayed a few days in central Cape Town close-by the iconic Table Mountain. It may interest you to know that it is exactly the same height as Snowdon (3560 feet) so affords a great view when not under a tablecloth of cloud. Fortunately, this cleared just in time for us to view the town below and Robben Island in the distance. It was here that Nelson Mandela was held for 18 of his 27 years in prison. It is only an eight mile boat trip from Cape Town so is a popular tourist destination. We

saw the cell in which he was held and had the conditions explained at length by an ex-prisoner. They were grim indeed. It is quite extraordinary that he managed to steer the country into the postapartheid era so peacefully. Such a pity that many of his successors didn't follow his lead. There is still widespread poverty amongst the





majority population with a 60% unemployment rate. As a result,

wages and prices are significantly lower than in the UK and tipping is an essential way of life. We saw acres of shanty town dwellings but,



surprisingly, very many sported satellite aerials.





On another trip we visited the Cape of Good Hope and saw a colony of African penguins on the town

beach and visited an ostrich farm. The former keep cool by digging a hole in the sand and sitting with an open beak. The latter have lovely eyelashes and try to eat anything that takes their fancy, including



Madeleine's hat. Their eggs weigh over 3lbs, which is about the same as 20 chickens' eggs. They take two hours





we called in to see an old Dutch Reform Church built in 1911. It

can seat over 1400 people! Quite a congregation. Very few native worshippers though!

An open jeep ride to see meerkats emerging was worth the pre-dawn hotel pick-up. Even if they did oversleep by an hour there were plenty of other animals to see.





One other memorable incident on this part of our trip was at the Bloukrans Bridge, which boasts the highest commercial bungee jump in the world. To our amazement, Dai, a jolly diminutive Welshman in our party took the dive, a drop of over 700 feet. At 73 years of age that takes some doing. He was regarded as such a hero that the rest of us had a whip round to cover the cost.

On returning to Cape Town we flew to Zimbabwe to see the Victoria Falls which is on the Zambezi River across from Botswana. Although the falls are very impressive we would still rate the Iguazu Falls between Argentina and Brazil as marginally superior. A word of warning should you be tempted to go there, the waterproof capes they provide





are nothing of the sort. The condensing spray means the site has permanent rainfall all day, every day. We got soaked. The evening cruise on the Zambezi was very relaxing though giving us the chance to view plenty of wild-life.

Accommodation was quite basic in comparison to South Africa; mosquitonetted beds in thatched chalets. Not unexpectedly, the economy is undeveloped and poverty seemed quite

widespread. After all, the town is very small and is set amid a vast expanse of savannah. The currency in everyday use is the US dollar as decades of hyperinflation have reduced successive versions of the local currency to be virtually worthless. We were approached several times by locals offering us thousands of Zimbabwe dollars for a few US ones; like something out of 30's Germany. It is hard to say whether or not prices are high as there was so little to buy. Only home-produced beads, bangles and carvings at the women's market

appealed. We bought some but wished we could have taken more, if only to help them. The exception to the rule was the Victoria Falls Hotel; a grand, five-star rated, Edwardian mansion overlooking the Victoria Falls Railway Bridge. Here a one-night stay costs between £500 and £900. Lunch on the terrace was very reasonable though. A fabulous curry for the same price as at the Jalsha near Sidcup station. It was so hot though; plenty of drink was needed to cool down after.



The next day we were taken on a fifty-mile drive into Botswana. Not deterred by the overcomplicated border formalities, we embarked on a bush drive followed by a cruise on the River Chobe, a tributary of the Zambezi, bordering Namibia. There was abundant wild-life as you can see from these photos. A pity there is not room to show more.











Our trip ended the following day when we returned to Blighty after a long wait in Johannesburg for a double-decker Dreamliner plane with 450 other passengers. A final twist though. Just a few minutes before landing at Heathrow at 4.30 a.m. we were told we were being diverted as it was the night the substation went up in flames and Heathrow was closed. Every cloud has a silver lining they say, and ours was that, as we were the very first flight to land that morning, there was room to send us to Gatwick rather than Barcelona. So just a couple of hours delay for us but pity the other passengers due onward flights to goodness knows where.

So hopefully we haven't bored you too much and at least you could see some nice animal photos.

The Church in Wasdale

On our last visit to Cumbria we spent a day by Wastwater. After a walk by the lake and over the fells enjoying spectacular views of this beautiful but somewhat remote valley we reached Wasdale Head. Here we found St Olaf's Church which claims to be the smallest Parish Church in England. Surrounded by some of England's highest mountains it has been described as 'a little stable with pews, ancient beams and a flagstone floor able to steat 35 people.' The earliest record of the church is 1550. It is the oldest building in Wasdale, standing at the side of the ancient packhorse trail over Sty Head. The Church is open each day from 9am to dusk. It is such a peaceful place to spend a quiet moment amongst such magnificent scenery.

Borough of East Ham Education Committee PRIZE Awarded To Jack Card, For General Progress, Walton Road Infants' School 28th June 1912.

In this section, two girls Bay and Mog discover what happens in The Town when they visited The Factory.

Bay and Mog once went to a factory to see rags turned into paper. They had often saved all the little pieces of stuff which were cut off when new clothes were being made, and every bit of rag they could find, and sold them for fourpence to the rag-and-bone man; and they always wondered what he did with them. Now they learned that he took them to a rag merchant, who put them with a great heap of others, so that they could be sorted by women and girls – the white cotton in one heap, the woollen things in another, and the coloured things in another. Then these were put into different sacks and taken to the factory.

In the factory there were a great number of people to do the work, and many engines. Bay and Mog saw rags being washed in a great tank of water; and they saw some in another tank, where a machine with hundreds of teeth was whirling round and round, and tearing them to tiny, tiny pieces, so that they and water became like pulp. Then they saw the pulp being dried and pressed, the dark into brown paper, while the white was made all glazy, so that it might become notepaper. Next they saw cutting and folding machines; and at last the manager gave each of them a beautiful packet of paper and envelopes, which had just been finished.


